Be aware that even on low risk days,
rip currents can still exist.

Bring your cell phone and know your exact location at the beach

In an emergency, to get the fastest response, a phone and address can save lives.

Never swim alone

Also have someone on shore watching you

Educate yourself and your family on rip currents

Watch the video located in your rental house, hotel room or hotel lobby
